The Board has been working hard to complete several important tasks that will have lasting impacts on our organization. They will be highlighted in this issue.

The work on the land and peoples acknowledgment is now complete. The Committee has familiarized itself with the history of the people who have

walked the land around Mt. Hood for many eons before European settlers arrived here. The article in this issue presents the story of how we constructed the land and peoples acknowledgment that will express the Friends of Timberline perspective.

Oregon artist Darrel Austin is the subject of an article included in this issue. Austin produced at least sixteen paintings for the WPA. Five of them, the Dishwashers, the Musicians, the Woodcutters, the Skier and the Fish Story, are on view at Timberline Lodge.

In the depths of the Great Depression, President Franklin Delano Roosevelt and the Works Progress Administration strove both to put masses of Americans back to work and to create works of inspiration that evoked among other things the joys of a better time. One WPA artist, Darrel Austin, took the directive directly to heart.

In 1937, Oregon WPA Administrator E.J. Griffith envisioned five representations, originally suggested as murals in the Timberline Lodge mezzanine but better viewed by Griffith as oil paintings that could be moved from time to time. The Regional Advisor of the Federal Art Project overseeing the WPA art proposals approved the project as a "series of easel paintings, framed, by Darrel Austin." Austin was awarded the commission and started to work.

The series of paintings by Austin that emerged were based on the theme of mountain activities and originally were displayed together. The paintings were entitled Musicians, Woodcutters, Dishwashers, Fish Story and The Skier. Each captures in bold representation the essence of the activity. A number of his works currently are on view at Timberline Lodge and invite the viewer to an earlier time.

Friends of Timberline Adopts a Land and Peoples Acknowledgment

A committee headed by Board member Doug Morten undertook the task of crafting a statement to recognize and honor the history and presence of numerous indigenous peoples in the Mt. Hood region surrounding Timberline Lodge as the focus of FOT's mission statement. Key members included Lisa Riversong who served as the liaison to the Grand Ronde and Warm Springs Tribal Councils as well as representing RLK & Company as the Lodge operator, and provided valuable assistance in reaching out to all stakeholders. Lisa also provided an important connection with US Forest Service personnel Allison Sweeney and Kaitlyn Kornder as well as RLK President Jeff Kohnstamm and his elite executive team. A number of FOT Board members added value to the process, offering insight, perspective and suggestions drawn from relations with First Nations cultures in the Portland vicinity as well as in the Mt. Hood community.

The resulting FOT Land and Peoples Acknowledgement statement is a document that, in its making, was to be kept simple and precise as directed by the FOT Executive Committee. It emerged in the wake of the in-depth and detailed Land Acknowledgement Statement that Timberline Lodge's RLK & Company has in place.

The goal was to craft a sincere and heartwarming message of respect for all people, particularly the historic indigenous peoples that inhabited our region prior to the kept records of historic content. It is our intent to reach out to all people that value the cultural heritage of our region. A most important segment of our document confirms the core values of our organization. It also suggests our organization's approach to our business practices.


UPGRADING THE TIMBERLINE POOL

After 65 years of alpine soothing and cooling, the Timberline pool has served its useful life. Decommissioning began in the fall of 2022, making way for a new pool and hot tub opening this winter at the historic Lodge.

A pool was planned in the original 1937 Timberline Lodge design with a \$110,000 budget attached. Questions were raised about what type of experience would be appropriate for the newly constructed iconic Lodge; a luxury resort affair vs. a wilderness gateway adventure. Regional Forester C.J. "Shirley" Buck decided against a pool in 1938, stating that "the presence of a pool denotes a distinct step away from the mountain recreation activities and toward urbanized forms".

In 1958, Timberline Area Operator Richard L. Kohnstamm moved forward with a pool concept and advertised the new amenity as the highest pool in the Pacific Northwest at an elevation of 6,000 feet. The pool served Timberline guests for decades, creating memories, relaxing and splashing in the shadows of Mr. Hood's summit.

Timberline has been working closely with the United States Forest Service, the Oregon State Historical Preservation Office, Friends of Timberline, Soderstrom Architects and Bremik Construction to create a design

becoming to Timberline's historical landscape while developing a project plan that fits within Mt. Hood's short summer 2023 construction window. Progress can be followed on Timberline's web cam. The new heated, year-round pool will be built within the same footprint as its predecessor, accessed by a skybridge from the west side hotel vestibule. This elevated access design allows for restoration of stone buttresses and building design features that have not been seen since 1958.

Other features include a sloped depth of 3'–8', an integrated hot tub with water features and gravity massage, low level lighting, public restrooms below the skybridge, and a bird friendly 75% glass enclosure preserving the awesome views. The pool will serve hotel guests and be available for group events and special occasions.

Timberline's current President and Area Operator Jeff Kohnstamm says "recreating the Timberline pool experience for our guests while preserving the historic value of the Lodge is what makes Timberline a very special and unique place. I could not be more excited about this new page in Timberline's story".

TIMBERLINE—A LIFELONG LOVE STORY — How Charles Matschek expressed his appreciation of the Lodge nearly 50 years ago.


In 1975 while studying architecture at the University of Oregon, my design professor that spring was Thomas Hacker. Our spring project began with a question: think about our favorite place, select a place we knew well and ask ourselves why it was our favorite above all others. We could use any media of our choosing to visually describe what was special and what made it special to us.

I immediately thought of Timberline Lodge. Thinking I knew it so well and nowhere I'd been had influenced me more. I'd grown up visiting the Lodge with family from a very young age with weekends during ski season. I learned to ski, was on Ski Patrol, climbed and hiked all over the mountain the entire time growing up and the Lodge was always a part of it. I read everything I could find and discovered there was guite a lot I did not know. This new knowledge inspired me to depict the spirit that had captured me.

With photography I tried and failed to capture what I was seeing, I had been doing a lot of drawing too and when I started with some trial sketches, I could feel the images starting to make sense to me.

These final plates are a result of my research, photography and sketching at the Lodge feeling I had discovered what makes Timberline such a special place.



Bylaw and Articles Vote at the FOT Annual Meeting

At the Friends of Timberline Board's request, its nonprofit attorney has prepared proposed updates to the FOT Bylaws and Articles of Incorporation which will be voted on at the Annual Members Meeting at the Lodge on Saturday, October 7 at 3:00 p.m. The proposed changes cover the following points:

- Removing provisions on the principal and registered office locations as that information is confirmed or updated annually with the Oregon Secretary of State.
- Providing that Directors will be elected by the Board instead of the members.
- Shortening the meeting notice provisions and adding provisions for attendance virtually.
- Adding a provision allowing voting by email.
- Removing the provision creating "Honorary Directors" while continuing to allow people to serve in that advisory non-director capacity.
- Prohibiting the same person from serving simultaneously as President, Secretary or Treasurer.
- Adding FOT's commitment to nondiscrimination to the Bylaws.
- Removing the indemnification provisions (except the insurance provision) and including those concepts in the Articles of Incorporation.
- Updating the indemnification provision to add the current statutory prohibition against indemnifying individuals liable for receiving an improper benefit from a nonprofit organization
- Providing a new procedure for amendment of Bylaws by the Board instead of the members.

TIMBERLINE CURATOR'S CORNER —COLLECTIVE WISDOM OF ITS TIME

Considered one of America's greatest comeback stories, our historic lodge is a true testimony to President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal promise—establishing arts and culture into the national identity. Collective wisdom of its time, the arts pivoted as a fundamental component of our democratic society. The lodge's story remains to be an inspiration for all.

Each year, millions of visitors from around the world experience a connection to the past here with art as its dialogue. Darrell Austin, a native-Northwest painter and WPA artist, was one such artist whose figurative paintings highlight the hope of a worker during an era of loss and despair. His collection is an intended focal point of the historic lodge's hexagonal Mezzanine, a place where viewers can get an up-close exposure to the Depression-era fine art provided by the WPA. We are mesmerized with the mastery of color within Austin's paintings, often compared to



Vincent Van Gogh. His depictions of the human experience enliven us to proceed to each of his paintings along the Mezzanine, as if we are anticipating the next page of a book.

We are thankful to

have the opportunity to feature whole collections of public art every day of the year free of charge to everyone. Unfortunately, the Portland Public School's goal to remove two of the five Austin paintings has given us reason to be concerned. Disrupting the series of Austin's paintings will compromise the Mezzanine's space, as well as its educational intent. We are seeking long-term determination for this collection and hope the Portland Public Schools can provide an end result for us that respects the esteem of the WPA artists. I will keep everyone updated about this topic!

Friends we will sadly miss...

Henk Pander 1937 – April 8, 2023

Henk Pander, a leading and influential figure in Oregon's art landscape, died at 85 after a short illness. His works infused Dutch art perspectives with Northwest perspectives, often emphasizing bluntness and force. As reported in the Oregonian obituary, art historian Roger Hull noted that "he is a remarkable Northwest master whose art provides a synthesis of New World and Old World experience in sometimes beautiful and sometimes toxic ways."

Henk served on the Friends of Timberline Board for a number of years, bringing an artist's eye and perspective to some of the projects undertaken by FOT. His interaction with the Lodge preceded his Board service; in 1976, he was commissioned to paint the portrait of C.S. Lewis which graces the entrance to the Lodge's C.S. Lewis Wing. More recently, in 2007, he was commissioned to paint the portrait of RLK founder Richard Kohnstamm that greets visitors in the Lodge entrance lobby. Other notable portraits by him include those of former Oregon Governors Tom McCall and John Kitzhaber hanging in the Capitol Building in Salem.



Bill White December 1, 1939 – June 21, 2023

The mountain has lost a dear friend. Friends of Timberline former President Bill White passed away on June 21 surrounded by his family. Growing up in Portland and graduating from Lewis and Clark College, Bill married Barbara Royce and began his career as a stockbroker. As son Tom and daughter Julie arrived, Bill and Barbara worked hard to create a place where family and friends could congregate at their mountain home in Brightwood. Skiing at Timberline Lodge was a favorite pastime for all.

Bill served as FOT President for several years in the 1980s and remained a loyal and appreciated part of the FOT family until his death. He was an excellent photographer and turned much of his retirement energy into collecting and preserving local pictorial history. He loved touring in his 1913 Model T Ford. Bill is survived by his wife Barbara, daughter Julie, brother Jim, and five grandchildren. He will be missed.
